Conservation in the Keys—How YOU Can Help!

Our marine ecosystem is central to everyday life here in the Keys and every local relies on it either directly or indirectly. Therefore, conservation of this precious natural treasure is essential! Here at Aquarium Encounters, we believe in conservation through education. We would like to give you some tips to help you protect this precious resource.



Did you know that coral reefs constitute just 1% of the ocean floor but over 25% of all marine species depend upon them at some point in their lives? Loss of coral reef habitat is devastating, not

just to local species, but to marine life worldwide. Our own Florida Reef Tract is home to over 40 species of coral, 500 species of fish, and countless invertebrates. Sadly, global warming and pollution are taking a drastic toll. We have partnered with Reef Renewal USA, Inc., to help grow new coral to be outplanted on the reefs in an effort to combat reef attrition

There are also things that you can do to help!

- Reduce water use-this reduces the amount of runoff carrying pollution that ultimately finds its way into the ocean.
- Reduce use of single-use plastics-these degrade into microplastics, which inhibit growth and nutrient uptake in many types of marine life.
- Use reef-safe sunscreen. Mineral sunscreens which contain compounds such as zinc oxide or titanium dioxide form a physical barrier against UVA and UVB rays without harming corals. Ingredients found in non-reef-safe sunscreen, such as oxybenzone, octinoxate, PABA, and others are known to cause coral bleaching and inhibit coral reproduction.

Our beautiful Florida Keys are a world class fishing destination. Tourism and commercial fishing of the Florida Keys National Marine Sanctuary together contribute over \$4.4 billion to Florida's annual economy and support over 40,000 jobs! The sanctuary also serves as an example of a well-managed fishery thanks to FWC regulation. They constantly monitor and adjust size and bag limits based on factors such as population estimates and reproduction rates. However, regulations are useless without the cooperation of fishermen. Here are some things all anglers can do:

• Stay up-to-date on regulations. This information can always be found on the MyFWC website. There are also a variety of apps

available that can provide current regulations based upon your exact location! Always have a measuring device with you to ensure that your catch is legal.

- Observe Sanctuary Preservation Area rules. These off-limits areas are marked off with yellow buoys for easy identification.
- Ensure that you have the correct endorsements for your target species. Refer to MyFWC to find out which ones you need if you are unsure.
- Check that you are carrying all necessary equipment for the type of fishing you are doing, as some types of equipment may be required by law.
- Use non-stainless steel hooks. This way, a hook that cannot be recovered will eventually dissolve away.
- Upon return, please avoid tossing your fish carcass refuse into the canals. The decaying carcasses deplete the canal water of dissolved oxygen which leads to methane buildup and can harm the ecosystem of the canal.

Manatees are one of Florida's most beloved species. Boat strikes remain one of their biggest threats. Here are things you can do to help keep our manatees safe:



- Wear polarized sunglasses when boating, to make it easier to spot them.
- If you do see manatees, please observe them passively from a distance. Do not approach or attempt to interact with them.
- Observe boating speed limits
- Discard fishing line, hooks, and trash properly.
- Resist the urge to feed or give water to manatees. This leads them to alter their natural behavior by conditioning them to approach people and boats and is a direct cause of boat strikes.
- If you see an injured, dead, tagged, or orphaned manatee, or if you see someone harassing a manatee, call 1-800-DIAL-FMP (1-800-342-5367) or VHF Channel 16 on your marine radio to report.

By following these simple guidelines and sharing them with others, you are helping conserve our most vital natural resource. From The Tackle Box

Hello and this is Captain Chris Still from The

Tackle Box. Did you know that February is a great month to fish for Wahoo, Kings, Cero and Spanish Mackerel. They all like the colder waters. On the bay side, you can catch the Spanish Mackerel about 12 to 14 miles out heading north and west. They like open waters and once you establish a

chum line, I find live shrimp works really well with a short stainless steel leader wire. By the way, what many folks don't



know, making ceviche from freshly caught Spanish Mackerel is delicious. I add lime, lemon, cilantro, red and green bell peppers, onion, diced jalapeno — give it a try. Smoking Mackerel for dip is also a favorite of mine too.

On the Ocean side I have had the best luck using pilchards on Cero Mackerel and Kings. I suggest fishing 40 to 80 foot of water, establish your chum line and bring them into your slick. You can't go wrong by frying or grilling. By the way, Mackerel is very healthy to eat; it is rich in protein and contains 18 different amino acids to keep your body healthy.
